Do the Honours!



At our Mothers Union meeting in October, we had a talk from Roy Catterall DL who spoke about the Honours System. BEMs, OBEs, MBEs etc are awarded twice a year, on the King's official birthday and New Years Eve.

Every day 'ordinary' people make an extraordinary difference across Greater Manchester. Chances are that you know at least one who immediately springs to mind. But have you ever thought of nominating them for a national Honour?

Reading the media coverage of the New Year and Birthday Honours Lists, you might come away with the mistaken impression that honours are only awarded to household names, or the retired who have dedicated their entire lives to community or charitable service.

Yet the reality is, that each year the King recognises the extraordinary achievements of people from all walks of life, and all ages, within our communities. These are the people who really make a difference to the lives of those around them.

Typically, over 70% of people who receive honours are people who have undertaken outstanding work in their communities.

However, Roy told us that although the Northwest is 11.2% of the UK population in the 2022 New Years list the NW received only 7.3% of honours. Greater Manchester is 4.2% of the UK population but from the same list only received 31 honours; 2.73% of the total. Consistently one of the bottom 3 regions nationally.

We know there are people out there who deserve an honour, but we need you to nominate them. So, if you know somebody who deserves to be recognised, please do the Honours!

Roy also spoke about KAVS.

The King's Award for Voluntary Service is the highest award given to volunteer groups across the UK. It is known as the MBE for groups of volunteers.

Any group of 3 or more people doing volunteering work can be nominated for the award. The majority of the group must be volunteers, and more than half the volunteers must have the right to live in the UK.

To be nominated they should have been doing outstanding work for at least 3 years that:

- is led by volunteers, not paid staff
- is based in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man
- provides a specific and direct benefit to their local communities

Anyone who is independent from the group can nominate. So again, if you know a group you think deserve to be nominated -Do the Honours!

Remembering Jill, where do I begin? Going back to around 1996 when several of us from St Mary's got involved in Operation Christmas Child and the warehouse was in Higher Openshaw. Jill was in the thick of it

checking that the boxes had sufficient in them, those were the days when you could put almost anything in shoeboxes for children or their mum and many of the boxes were bigger than today's OCC boxes. We continued the annual OCC teamwork in church and in the Stockport or Tameside warehouses every year until 2019 when the warehouse was in Droylsden Shopping Centre. Over all those years it was Jill who made up far more boxes than anyone from church, it took me several years to realise this, as Jill never mentioned it. Jill was working at the warehouse almost every day over the 3-to-4-week period in November to early December. From 10.30 am to 3.30 pm. Jill would stay on for the evening shift when Dan would be at the warehouse helping. Oh! and Jill would catch the bus to Ashton bus station then walk the mile or more to the out-of-town industrial area warehouse. I'd offer to give her a lift if she could meet at church, but she just said, 'No it's ok I can manage.'

When the occ warehouses closed in Tameside due to Management changes to the system of checking & collecting. Jill would still be the one to make up more boxes than anyone and produce more hats, scarves and knitted items for children and for the past couple of years she would buy 100 OCC Flat-pack boxes, 50 for her to do and 50 for church. Jill never one to say a lot - Just did it.

I'm sure many of her church friends could add their thoughts of Jill from their involvement of working with Jill in several of our church activities.

How to make stew

Year 6 grew their own vegetables, but you can use fresh or tinned.

We cooked it on an open fire but you can use an oven.

Ingredients

1 Tin of cannellini beans; 4 medium sized potatoes ; 2 Chicken stock cubes: Water Season to taste

Serves 4

<u>Method</u>

- 1. First, finely chop your carrots, potatoes and onions.
- 2. Then put them in a casserole dish or large pan.
- 3. Next, add the cannellini beans and beef.

- 4. After that, cover the vegetables and meat with water.
- 5. Crumble the chicken stock in the dish and season to taste.
- **6.** Cook for approximately 1 hour or until the vegetables soften.

Be careful when taking the casserole dish out of the oven as it will be very hot.



How to make a delicious coco pop square

You will need


- 1 box of coco pops.
- As many bars of chocolate as you want
- A spread (your choice of flavor)
- A large spoon
- Hot water
- A knife
- A pan



Method

- To begin, wash your hands so there are no germs on your hands.
- 2. Carefully heat the water in the pan.
- 3. Evenly break the chocolate into pieces and put it into a bowl. 4. Next, stir the chocolate into the bowl while the bowl is on the pan.
- 5. When the chocolate has melted, pour just over half of the box of coco pops in.
- 6. When you have stirred it, evenly put it into the tray.
- 7. Using the spoon, press it down so it is flat.
- 8. Place the mixture into the fridge for 30 mins.
- 9.1f wanted, apply the spread to the top of the mixture.
- 10. Put it back into the fridge for another 30 mins.
- 11. Take it out of the fridge.
- 12. Finally, cut it into even squares.


